Class 1: We are progressing steadily with our phonics and we have now looked at Set1 (SATP) and Set2 (INMD). Some of the children have begun to say the sounds in words and are blending these sound to read some simple words, it, is and tin. The children have continued this week with writing their names which are becoming more legible. Reception children have had their first outdoor science this week in the garden. They really enjoyed exploring the garden's environment and were fascinated with the pictures they created from the scavenger hunt.

In maths we have been counting objects then matching these to the numbers. At this stage many 4 year olds can count beyond 10 but some don't understand the link between the counting and the number of objects. Try counting everything at home; bottles, tins, spoons and cups etc. Carefully moving one item, one number in the count.

Class 2: This week we have been revisiting the names and properties of 2D shapes and recording how we can split them into halves, thirds and quarters. We have also been thinking about what fraction of our plates should be made up of protein, energy foods such as pasta or potatoes, and vegetables for vitamins and fibre. We also enjoyed playing tens and units bingo and measuring in metres. We have been looking at how the sense of touch

can become stronger to read Braille and how watching carefully we can use sight to share ideas using sign language.

Class 3: This week Class 3 have been building their comprehension skills and experimenting with subordinate clauses and conjunctions using 'I SAW A LABUB'. In science we have constructed our own lifesized skeleton by working as a team with our growing knowledge of the human body. We have looked at how our skeletons protect us and help us move in P.E. We have also been looking at our homework and how we can help develop our spelling and maths skills.

Class 4: On Wednesday, we went down into the garden to write autumn and senses poetry. We looked at figurative language, including similes, onomatopoeia, alliteration and personification. How many examples can you spot in the poem that the children wrote together?
